


1. Go to the OCSB Student Portal <u>https://sites.google.com/a/ocsbstudent.ca/k-6/</u> and click on **Google Drive**. You will have to log in using your student email and password.

2. Now you have a list of folders available. Click on the Language folder. Once the


on the left hand side, and then



either "file upload" (if you want to upload a picture(s) of your work, or

"Google Docs" if you want to start a new doc and paste the picture(s) of your work in the doc.

3. If you choose to put your picture into a Google Doc, once you have created a title for



your doc (My Weekend Journal), click on the insert image icon choose where you want to insert the picture from.

4. The document saves automatically, and I can view the work you've done!

5. Send me an email so I know you have sent me something to see in your Language folder!

6. After you have completed a written journal entry, feel free to start a google doc and practice typing, or voicing in another written piece of work! Don't forget to use the

Sentence Writing Checkbric:

Sentence Criteria	Consistently	Usually	Sometimes	Rarely
Start with a capital letter (beginning of a sentence or a name)				
End with a punctuation mark (. ? !)				
Written in lowercase letters (unless a name or the beginning of a sentence)				
Have a finger space between words				
Have common words and word wall words spelled correctly				
Have sounds of unknown words represented by appropriate letters				
Written neatly on the line and begin at the margin and stop at the end of the given line				
5+ complete sentences that make sense				
Sentences are connected to the related topic				
Details enhance the quality of sentences
