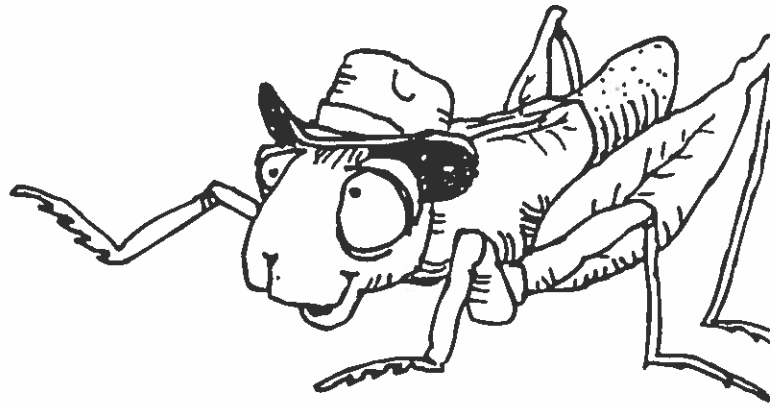


Bugs!



“Eeek! A bug!” shouted Susan.

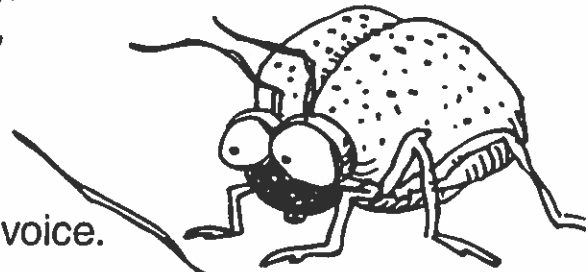
“I’m not a bug. I’m a grasshopper,” said a tiny, little voice.

“I’m not a bug. I’m a beetle,” said a tiny, little voice.

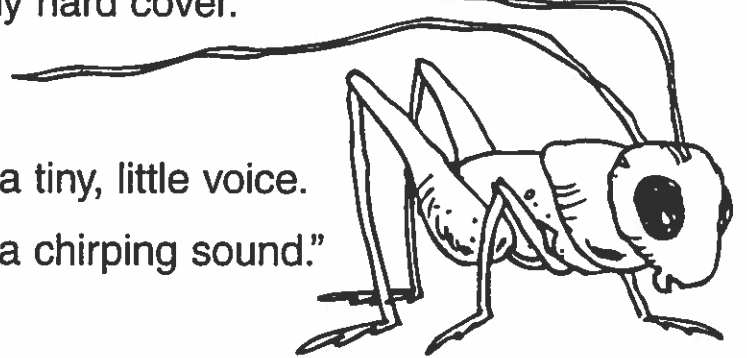
“My wings are protected by a shiny hard cover.”

“I’m not a bug. I’m a cricket,” said a tiny, little voice.

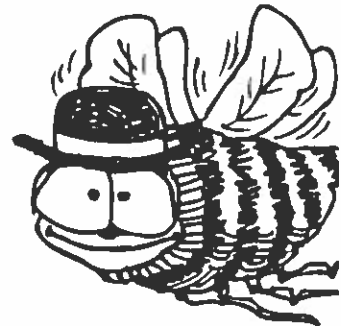
“I rub my wings together to make a chirping sound.”

“I’m not a bug. I’m a bumblebee,” said a tiny, little voice.

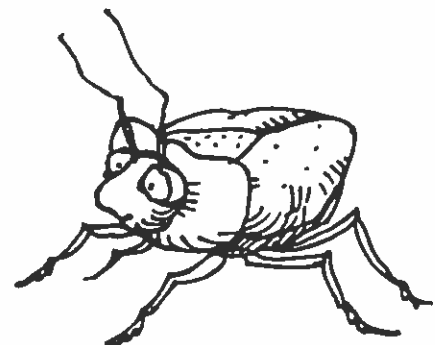
“I fly from flower to flower collecting pollen to take back to my hive.”

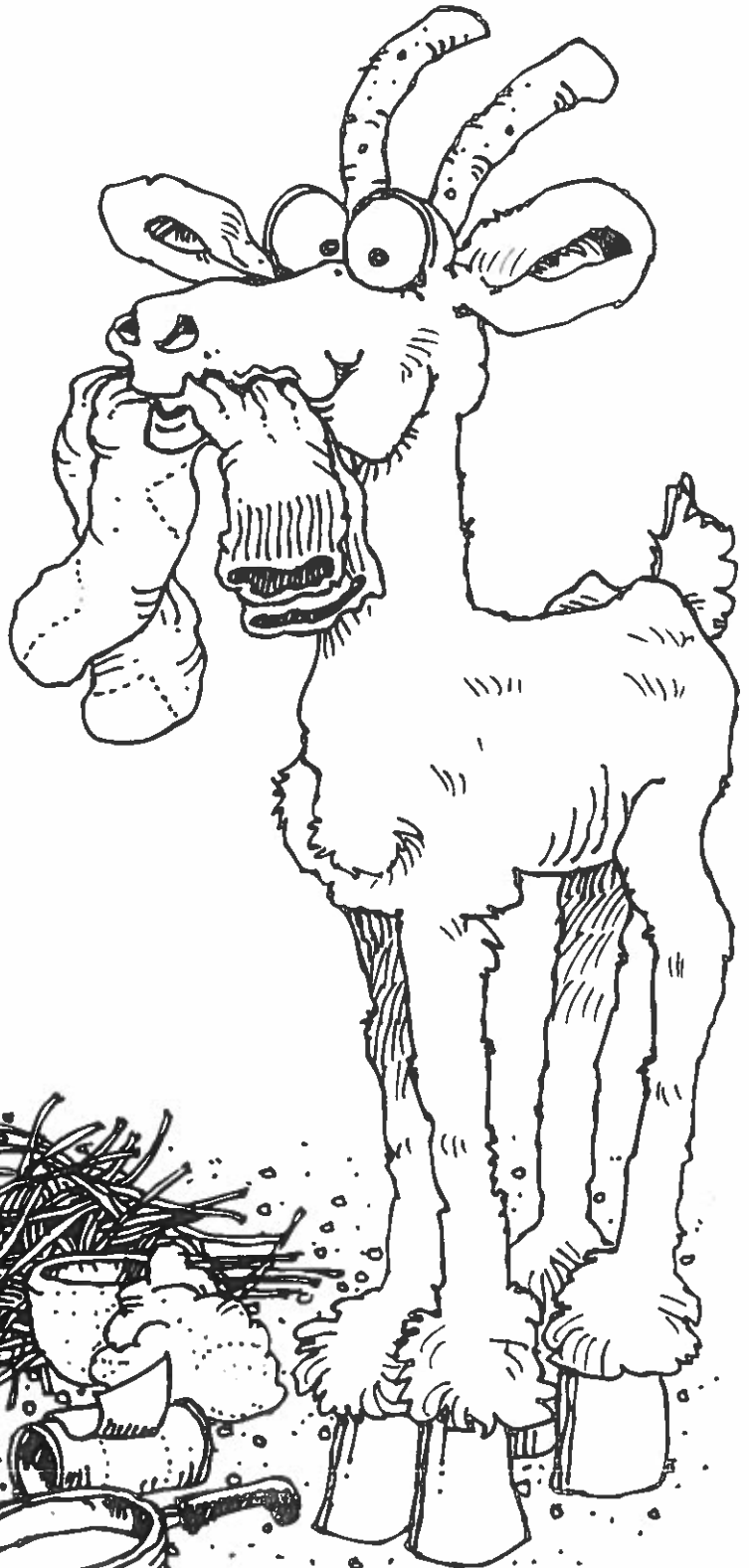

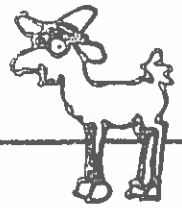

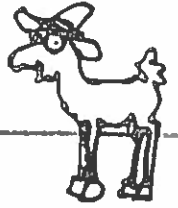
